This is our final letter as co-presidents. It has been a busy, productive year for our League. Many members have contributed their time, energy, and talents to our efforts; and we are very appreciative of all the work we have accomplished together.

During the 2007–08 year, we hosted a presentation in September about challenges facing the school districts that serve our members, presented by the district school board chairs; we spent two months discussing and taking consensus on the national study of immigration policy, adopted in 2006 and now ready for us to act on; the Voter Service Committee hosted four candidate forums; and we reached concurrence on our state position on the selection of judges—in the midst of our Holiday Party!

In January we hosted Met Council representatives and many of our elected state legislators for a conversation with us about issues and concerns. Liz Doyle from TakeAction Minnesota spoke to us in February about access to health care, and Susan Gehrz spoke to us in March about emergency preparedness. And in April, State Rep. Paul Gardner discussed legislation he has authored or supports concerning our water supply and recycling.

As you can see, we provided many opportunities to educate, inform, and discuss many issues in our country, state, and communities. All of this is possible because of our dedicated, committed members.

We accomplished a major overhaul of our Web site to better serve our members and the public, and we changed the location of our Tuesday unit meetings to Grumpy's (after the demise of our previous restaurant setting)! We had a great book sale, and now we are preparing to participate, along with some of our younger citizens, in distributing American flags during the Rosefest parade in June. Thanks to all who worked to make the annual Book Sale on April 20 a big success! Sales came to \$730.10, and we made \$34 for books sold to Half Price Books afterwards, for total sales of \$764.10. A \$5 donation made that \$769.10. Expenses, for rental of space at Fairview Community Center (\$75) and help of Scout leader and four Boy Scouts (\$25), totaled \$100, leaving us earnings of \$669.10. Once again, this was a very good sale!

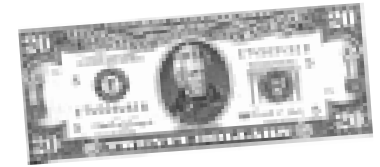

Thanks also to those who loaned bookcases, crates, flowers, and toys to make our sale tables more interesting. On Sunday, we sold about 55 boxes of books, and people commented on how attractive the sales tables were.

We accomplished so much on Friday afternoon that we finished setting up in record time on Saturday, and everyone left about noon, after we ate lunch. After the sale, a

Windows and Mirrors for All

Layers of the Onion

Let me say right up front—yes, I know that the *Onion* is not a "real" newspaper. I know it is trying to be outrageous. Humor dares to express things that would not be considered respectful. And yes, it sometimes makes me chuckle by verbalizing feelings people hold in their guts and rarely articulate.

Consider the following headlines: "Study: 38% of People Not Actually Entitled to Their Opinion" (the *Onion*, May 24, 2007, p. 1) and "You Know What's Stupid? Everything I Don't Understand" (the *Onion*, March 5, 2008, p. 14). These headlines and the accompanying articles deal with distinct, but related, ideas/feelings. One refers to the conflict between the open-minded idea that opinions can be diverse and the reality that people who say this often don't have much respect or acceptance of many opinions; the other states the not so open-minded idea that complicated things are threatening and therefore can be rejected, coupled with a veiled condemnation of those who behave this way.

Admit it. You've heard people say in one breath that everyone is entitled to his or her opinion and in the next, state a strong opinion, generally disagreeing vehemently with whatever came before the assurance. Said assurance is often pretty much *pro forma* when feelings are running high. We are right and those other idiots are wrong, and so long as they persist in holding to that stupid opinion—to which they are entitled—they will be wrong, wrong, wrong. The more emotional the topic, the less respect actually is given to opposing viewpoints. Respect might lead to a need to compromise; and when the issue is emotional, there is no room for compromise.

There is a huge chasm between opinions that cannot be bridged for those with absolute beliefs. They scorn as wishy-washy "moral relativism" positions that allow for compromise and respectful disagreement. Examples of issues that too often create such a chasm are abortion and homosexual marriage. On such topics, people seem to think that it is not enough to use their moral decisions to guide their own behavior; they are so sure of their rectitude that they demand that others also follow their moral decisions.

So far I have been implying that the "right" to one's opinion is tied to the content of the opinion. Sometimes, though, the supposed lack of intelligence or ability to reason or comprehend issues is stated as the reason to support a limitation on the right to an opinion. Some men opposed women's suffrage by saying that women did not have the capacity to understand the issues, they would not make good decisions, and they should not "bother their pretty little heads" with difficult topics. Similar arguments were made to support laws used to prevent African Americans from registering to vote. Sometimes self protection or privilege is behind such an argument, whether global or individual in application.

This leads us to the second headline. It often appears that people who offer simple answers gain ground over those who try to explain why there is no simple answer. Easy, simple answers to complex problems are profoundly appealing. Complexity is difficult to understand and often creates an uncomfortable moral ambiguity. But it is the reality of the world. One can define a simple set of guidelines for behavior and decision making; applying even the best of such guidelines to a diverse world is never simple. Guiding principles are a necessary beginning, but they do not end the need for careful thought. They provide a framework for it.

Living out acceptance of diversity of thought is not easy or simple. It is not always comfortable and safe. It requires one to examine what it means to believe something and how one can live out one's beliefs while tolerating other beliefs. It requires one to try to understand why one believes something. It

requires one to think before acting, listen before rejecting, and understand oneself before condemning another. It requires compassion and flexibility. What does it mean for our actions if we conclude that some positions are fundamentally incompatible? True tolerance of difference of opinion is more rare and difficult than we'd like to believe.

Highlights of the 55th Annual Meeting, held May 1

Board: See new holders of board and off-board positions at left. The proposed nominees were voted in unanimously. As you can see, volunteers are still needed for several positions. If you would be willing to serve in one of these positions, please contact one of the co-presidents. Additional volunteers are also needed for the Voter Service Committee in this election year, so consider joining Linda and Julie. Call one of them to offer your help.

Local Program: The proposed program was adopted, with no new local studies and no positions dropped. LWVROMaFH will continue to monitor housing and maintenance code enforcement procedures in Roseville and compare with the other cities the local League serves. The committee expects to report to the members during the 2008–09 year on what they have discovered.

Rose Awards: In keeping with tradition, single roses in bud vases were awarded at the Annual Meeting to recognize service to LWVROMaFH during the year. This year's winners are **Diane Nystrom**, who served on the Program Committee and single-handedly planned two programs, while also taking care of *Voter* mailings, and **Judy Rosenblatt** (also on the Program Committee), who researched, presented information, and oversaw consensus on the LWVUS study of immigration policy at two meetings last fall. A special rose was presented to **Teri Kysylyczyn**, who is continuing as co-president for a fourth year.

Speakers: Unfortunately, **Keesha Gaskins**, executive director of LWVMN, was unable to attend the meeting and address the group because of a family emergency. Toward the end of the meeting, **Mindy Greiling**, former RoMaFH president and District 623 School Board member, now representing House District 54A in the State Legislature and chair of the House K–12 Education Finance Committee, was called on to report on the progress of legislation. She noted that the end of the session is approaching—May 19—and commented on the status of bills on issues League members care about, including education, health care, and transportation.

Money: The treasurer provided a summary of accounts for the fiscal year ending March 31 (see the ending figures in the report on page 3). The proposed budget was passed without amendments (see on page 7). Note the dues changes, which were approved at last year's Annual Meeting to begin this fiscal year. Individual yearly dues are now \$55, household memberships (for two or more) are \$80, and the introductory rate for new members remains at \$40. See the contributors to the finance drive on page 6 and the book sale report on page 3.

Presenter at the March 15 meeting was Aggie Leitheiser, LWV St. Louis Park, Director of Emergency Preparedness for the MN Department of Health.

"We have no natural immunity to the flu, and it changes every year. While scientists try to determine what the next strain will be so that vaccine can be developed, it is both art and science. The big concern is with the H5N1 flu virus, commonly called Bird Flu, because 60% of the people who have come down with it have died. One of the

big problems is how quickly it can happen. Usually a person is infected before feeling sick and in some cases can feel well in the morning, feel sick in the afternoon and die that night.

“It’s important to seek help immediately.

“There are a number of simple things we can do to limit our exposure. Covering coughs (by coughing in your sleeve) and washing hands frequently are the easiest....(I)t is important to have enough supplies on hand [during a quarantine] to last up to 12 weeks or more.

* * *

“Government at all levels has been working on this issue for several years. Partnerships have been formed with the private sector including hospitals. Much of this planning has been helpful in other emergencies....

“Research continues to develop vaccines and antiviral medicine, but there is a 6–9 month lag in the time [between when] a virus is detected and when the vaccine is ready. Because there will not be enough vaccine for everyone tough decisions will need to be made as to who gets the vaccine.

“We will also face other human, legal and economic issues, but preparation will be key in getting through this situation.”
